G20

- EU and 19 countries
- 85% of global GDP and 66% of world's population
- Originally a forum of finance ministers and central bank presidents
- In 2008, participants and topics expanded

G20 (cont)

- Annual goal: Final declaration
- Two work channels:
 - Finance
 - Sherpas
- Affinity Groups make recommendations
- 2018 Affinity Groups: Business 20 (B20), Civil 20 (C20), Labour 20 (L20), Science 20 (S20), Think 20 (T20), Women 20 (W20), Youth 20 (Y20)
