














Size of workforce

- Complementary approaches to immigration


Quality of workforce

GDP South Asia (Per Capita 2016)




GDP East Asia (Per capita 2016)

- Most health systems in Asia are not adapted to epidemiological transition


Rise of NCDs exceeds decline of infectious diseases in developing countries




